# DECISION OF TRIBUNAL VARYING TIME WITHIN WHICH CERTAIN DOCUMENTS TO BE PROVIDED TO PLAINTIFF<sup>1</sup>

# **Background**

[1] The decision of the Tribunal given on 7 July 2015 required the Capital & Coast District Health Board (CCDHB) to provide to Ms Watson certain documents within five days after the date on which the Tribunal's decision was delivered. See para [149.4]:

[149.4] The Response to Complaint and the Meeting Notes of 16 January 2013 are to be provided to Ms Watson (without redaction) within five days after the date on which this decision is given.

- [2] On 9 July 2015 the CCDHB sought a variation of that order, proposing it take effect five working days after the expiry of the 30 day appeal period. Otherwise the CCDHB's right to appeal would be rendered nugatory.
- [3] Ms Watson opposes the application on the grounds the CCDHB is a large organisation possessed of sufficient funds and access to legal advice to permit an early decision whether to appeal. In the alternative, if some delay is to be allowed, it should not exceed 10 days.

#### **Discussion**

- [4] It is not asserted by Ms Watson she will be prejudiced by the delay. As against this the CCDHB is able to point to a real risk of prejudice.
- [5] In these circumstances the application by the CCDHB is granted.

# **FORMAL ORDER**

**[6]** The order at [149.4] of the Tribunal decision given on 7 July 2015 is varied to the extent only that it is now to take effect five working days after the expiry of the statutory appeal period.
