## Order in Council: Electoral (Expenditure Limit) Order 2022

### Proposal

- 1 I recommend that the Cabinet Legislation Committee approve the attached Electoral (Expenditure Limit) Order 2022 for submission to the Executive Council.

### Electoral (Expenditure Limit) Order 2022

- 2 The Electoral (Expenditure Limit) Order adjusts certain electoral expenditure limits to reflect movement in the Consumers Price Index All Groups ('the CPI').
- 3 Section 266A of the Act requires that certain electoral expenditure limits are adjusted annually to account for inflation. This must be done by an Order in Council coming into force on 1 July each year.
- 4 The Order does not involve any new policy decisions. The Act provides that the expenditure limits below must be adjusted annually to reflect the CPI movement between the quarter ending 31 March of the previous year and the quarter ending 31 March of the current year. The limits to be adjusted are the limits on what promoters (registered and unregistered), candidates and parties can spend on election expenses, and include GST.
- 5 The CPI increased by 6.9% from 31 March 2021 to 31 March 2022.
- 6 The table below shows the current expenditure limits and the inflation-adjusted expenditure limits that will be set by this Order, coming into force on 1 July 2022. All figures have been rounded in accordance with the Act.
- 7 These adjusted limits will apply to any election, or by-election, with a regulated period beginning between 1 July 2022 and 30 June 2023. The new limits will therefore **not** apply for the upcoming Tauranga by-election on Saturday 18 June 2022.

### Timing and 28-day rule

- 8 The Electoral (Expenditure Limit) Order will come into effect on 1 July 2022. No waiver of the 28-day rule is sought.

<sup>1</sup> The Act provides that if, after adjustment, any amounts is not a whole number of hundred dollars or thousand dollars, the adjusted amount must be rounded up to the next whole hundred dollars (Sections 204B(1)(d), 205C(1)(a) and (b), and 206C(1)(b) and (2)) or thousand (Sections 206C(1)(a) and 206V).

<sup>2</sup> The Act provides that, if an expenditure limit has been rounded up in accordance with the Act, the adjustment to that expenditure limit made the following year must be based on the unrounded figure.

## Compliance

- 9 The Order complies with the following:
- 9.1 the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi;
  - 9.2 the rights and freedoms contained in the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990 and the Human Rights Act 1993;
  - 9.3 the principles and guidelines set out in the Privacy Act 2020;
  - 9.4 relevant international standards and obligations; and
  - 9.5 the Legislation Guidelines.

## Regulations Review Committee

- 10 There are no grounds on which the Regulations Review Committee should draw the Order to the special attention of the House in accordance with Standing Order 327.

## Certification by Parliamentary Counsel

- 11 Parliamentary Counsel has certified the Order in Council as being in order for submission to the Executive Council.

## Impact Analysis

- 12 The Regulatory Impact Analysis Team at the Treasury has determined that proposal to adjust electoral expenditure limits to account for inflation is exempt from the requirement to provide a Regulatory Impact Statement on the grounds that government has limited statutory decision-making discretion or responsibility for the content of proposed delegated legislation.

## Publicity

- 13 For by-elections with a regulated period beginning after 1 July 2022 the Electoral Commission will publicise the 2022 adjusted expenditure limits.

## Proactive release

- 14 I will proactively release this paper in accordance with Cabinet Office Circular CO (18) 4.

## Consultation

- 15 The Treasury, the Electoral Commission and Statistics New Zealand have been consulted on this paper.

## Recommendations

- 16 I recommend that the Cabinet Legislation Committee:
