## Official Information Act request: Illegitimacy in law

Thank you for your email of 27 March 2023 in which you requested:

"When was the status of illegitimate removed in Aotearoa? When was the use of the word "illegitimate" removed from all legislation?"

Your request has been referred to me for response, as it falls within my responsibilities as Policy Manager, Family Law, and is being managed in accordance with the provisions of the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act).

I have interpreted your request as to the date the status of illegitimate was repealed from New Zealand legislation.

The purpose of the Official Information Act is to provide access to official information held by the Government, in order to enable participation in law-making and promote the accountability of Ministers and officials. There is no requirement under the Act for agencies to create new information, compile information they do not hold, provide legal advice, respond to hypothetical questions, or provide or prove an opinion.

Your request does not appear to be a request for official information, and I am therefore refusing it under section 18(g) of the Act, on the grounds that the information sought is not held by the Ministry and I have no grounds for believing it is held by another agency subject to the Act.

If you want to find out more information about the use of 'illegitimate' in New Zealand laws, the Status of Children Act 1969 provides a starting point.
