## Consistency with the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990: Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement (CPTPP) Amendment Bill

## Purpose

- 1. We have considered whether the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement (CPTPP) Amendment Bill ('the Bill') is consistent with the rights and freedoms affirmed in the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990 ('the Bill of Rights Act').
- 2. We have not yet received a final version of the Bill. This advice has been prepared in relation to the latest version of the Bill (PCO 20954/4.0). We will provide you with further advice if the final version includes amendments that affect the conclusions in this advice.
- 3. The Bill amends the Trans-Pacific Partnership Agreement Amendment Act 2016 to make changes necessary for New Zealand to ratify the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership.
- 4. To that effect, it makes minor amendments to the following Acts and regulations:
  - a. Copyright Act 1994;
  - b. Customs and Excise Act 1996;
  - c. Tariff Act 1988;
  - d. Hazardous Substances and New Organisms Act 1996;
  - e. Wine Regulations 2006;
  - f. Overseas Investment Act 2005;
  - g. Patents Act 2013;
  - h. Trade Marks Act 2002; and
  - i. Legislation Act 2012.
- 5. We have concluded that the Bill appears to be consistent with the rights and freedoms affirmed in the Bill of Rights Act.
